




Boundary – a vertical plane that cuts through the rocks below and the airspace above, dividing one state territory from another.




- Define: documentation of where the boundary is by listing geographic features of points of latitude and longitude
- Written in a treaty



Delimitation:
 putting the
 boundary from a
 treaty on a map
 officially



- Demarcation: Once border has been written in a treaty and a map
- Physical barriers are constructed on the ground to mark border
 - Fence, walls, pillars, posts, signs, gap in trees





- Administrate: once border is demarcated both sides determine how border is run
 - Immigration check points, militarized, undefended





TYPES OF BOUNDARIES: GEOMETRIC

- Straight line
- Sometimes latitude or longitude
- No regard for physical features or cultural boundaries










TYPES OF BOUNDARIES: PHYSICAL

- Using natural features such as mountains, rivers, lakes, or deserts
- EX:
 - Lake Nyasa between Malawi & Mozambique
 - Danube River is border for many European nations such as Serbia, Croatia, Hungary
 - Miss. River is border of many US states
 - Great Lakes between USA & Canada










TYPES OF BOUNDARIES: CULTURAL


- Based on human factors
 - Ex: ethnic groups
 - linguistic groups
 - Religious groups



MARITIME BORDERS


- Law of the Sea
- Exclusive EconomicZone
 - 200 nautical miles from coast
 - Exclusive rights to resources





The Next Frontier

By joining the Law of the Sea Treaty, the U.S. could claim an additional 291,000 square miles of seabed for oil, gas and mineral exploration.



BOUNDARY DISPUTE: **DEFINITIONAL**

- When border treaties are interpreted two different ways
- Examples:
 - Border between USA & Canada in Maine
 - Kuril Islands between Japan and Russia

- 2 Granted to Britain 1831 and then to USA 1842




KASHMIR BORDER DISPUTE

BOUNDARY DISPUTE: **TERRITORIAL**

- When the border moves and states cannot agree upon the border,
- Example: a river changing course
 - Danube River between Croatia and Serbia
 - Brahmaputra River between Bangladesh and India



BOUNDARY DISPUTE: **OPERATIONAL**


- Neighboring states
 cannot agree on policies
 that apply to border, esp.
 cross border migration
- EX:
 - USA & Mexico border






BOUNDARY DISPUTE: ALLOCATIONAL

- Involves distribution of natural resources
- Oil, water
- Ex:
 - Colorado River
 - Oil in Iraq & Kuwait,
 Saudi Arabia & Yemen
